India-Maldives ties come a long way with PM's visit to Male

Male/New Delhi (UNI)

From "India Out" to India In. India-Maldives relations have come a long way with Prime Minister Narendra Modi's State visit to the Indian Ocean island nation which concluded today.

Prime Minister Modi who arrived in the Maldivian capital Male yesterday on a two-day State visit, was the Guest of Honour at Maldives 60th Independence Day marking a "milestone" in bilateral ties between the two countries, an official spokesman said. This year also marks 60 years of the establishment of diplomatic relations between the two countries.

This is the first time that an Indian Prime Minister attended the Independence Day celebrations in Maldives. Prime Minister Modi is also the first foreign leader at the level of Head of State or Government to be



hosted by President Muizzu. Ironically, President Muizzu had won the elections mainly on "India Out" campaign. His three Ministers had criticised Prime Minister Modi

which resulted in a tailspin in relations between the two countries.

The two leaders held discussions in a restricted format yesterday which were followed by delegation-

level talks.

The two countries signed three Agreements and four Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) after the delegation-level talks including on initiating discussions on a Free Trade Agreement (FTA) between the two countries.

India also extended a Rs 4850 crore Line of Credit to the Maldives which would be utilised to develop priority sectors including Defence, health and housing. Both leaders inaugurated the Maldives Defence Ministry building in male and released a postage stamp commemorating 60 years of establishment of diplomatic relations between the two countries.

President Muizzu who hosted a State Banquet in honour of Prime Minister Modi yesterday, described him as a "wonderful person."

ED attaches Rs 106.26 cr in money laundering case

Involving former UCO Bank CMD

Kolkata: The Enforcement Directorate (ED), probing a money laundering case involving over Rs 6,000 crore against arrested former UCO Bank CMD Subodh Kumar Goel, has issued an attachment notice of Rs 106.26 crore of immovable and immoveable property of Goel, his family members and other allegedly involved in the fraud, the agency said in a statement.

Additionally a supplementary prosecution complaint has been filed before a special Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) court in Kolkata against Goel, his family members, close aides and other related companies.

The ED began investigation following an FIR filed by the other central agency -CBI's Bank Securities and Fraud Branch, against Concact Steel & Power Ltd. (CSPL) and its di-



rectors/promoters for defrauding banks/ financial institutions to the tune of Rs 6,210.72 crore (excluding interest) through various fraudulent practices.

These malpractices include diversion and siphoning of funds, submission of inflated stock statements, manipulation of balance sheet etc. and accordingly the accused persons have cheated the banks/FIs to the tune of Rs 6210.72 crore, the ED said.

Four family members die by suicide

Tihar Village gripped by grief as investigation unfolds



Khurai: A profound tragedy has rocked Tihar village in the Khurai region, as four members of a single family died by suicide after allegedly consuming a poisonous substance. The horrifying incident unfolded late at night in their farmhouse located

near the village, sending shockwaves through the community and leaving residents reeling in disbelief.
