MUSTREAD At least 18 killed, 24 injured in central Peru road accident

Lima: At least 18 people died and 24 others were injured in a road accident in the central Peruvian region of Junin, according to local media La Republica. The accident occurred on Friday when a double-decker bus from the Expreso Molina Lider Internacional company fell into an abyss on a central highway near the Talca district in Tarma province. Members of the Tarma Fire Department, the National Police, and health personnel arrived to rescue the injured, several of whom were trapped between the twisted iron, according to the state-run TV Peru.

Philippine cyclones death toll rises to 30

Manila: At least 30 Filipinos are now known to have died in the southwest monsoon enhanced by three tropical cyclones that triggered flash floods and landslides in the Philippines since last week, a Philippine govern-ment agency said on Saturday. In a report, the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (NDRRMC) reported that seven others are missing, either swept away by flash floods or buried in landslides. It added that the massive flooding and landslides also re-sulted in 10 injuries.

Quake measuring 6.1 hits northern Molucca Sea

Jakarta: An earthquake with a jolted the magnitude of 6.1 northern Molucca Sea in the western Pacific Ocean at 21:30:01 GMT on Friday, the GFZ German Research Centre for Geosciences said. The epicenter, with a depth of 131.4 km, was initially determined to be at 1.98 degrees north latitude and 126.87 degrees east longitude.

China issues yellow alert for heavy rainfall

Beijing: China's national observatory on Saturday continued to issue a yellow alert for rainstorms as heavy rainfall is expected in several regions across the country over the next 24 hours. The National Meteorolog-ical Center (NMC) forecast that from 2 p.m. Saturday to 2 p.m. Sunday, heavy to torrential rain is expected to hit regions including Înner Mongolia, Shaanxi, Shanxi, Hebei, Beijing, Liaoning and Jilin. Some parts in Inner Mongolia, Hebei, Jilin, Fujian and Yunnan are likely to experience heavy rainfall of up to 180 mm during the period, with thunderstorms and strong winds also possible in some areas, according to NMC. It ad-vised local authorities to make appropriate preparations and inspect the drainage systems in cities, farmlands and fishponds.

Australia-UK sign 50-year AUKUS defence treaty amid US review

Canberra/London (UNI)

Australia and the United Kingdom (UK) signed a 50-year commitment to the AUKUS defence treaty today, despite the United States' ongoing review of the pact.

Australia's Deputy Prime Minister and Defence Minister Richard Marles and UK Defence Secretary John Healey signed the bilateral Nuclear-Powered Submarine Partnership and Collaboration Treaty (the Geelong Treaty) at their meeting in Geelong, Victoria.

"The Geelong Treaty is a historic agreement, the commitment for the next 50 years of UK-Australian bilateral defence cooperation under AUKUS Pillar I," Marles and Healey said in a joint statement.

The Geelong Treaty will enable comprehensive cooperation on the design, build, operation, sustainment, and disposal of their SSN-



AUKUS submarines, according to the statement.

It will support the development of the personnel, workforce, infrastructure and regulatory systems required for Australia's SSN-AUKUS program, as well as support port visits and the rotational presence of a UK Astuteclass submarine at HMAS Stirling under Submarine Rotational Force -

West. The signing of the treaty came as the United States wavers on its role in the AUKUS alliance. The U.S. Department of Defence has announced a review of the trilateral security partnership to determine whether the agreement aligns with the "America First" agenda.

Russia lifts lid on secretive drone factory

Moscow (UNI)

In the first official glimpse inside the production facility of Russia's main attack drone factory, Moscow has now chosen to publicize the factory and its contribution to Russia's war effort. Standing at the Alabuga factory amid rows of the distinctive black, triangular Iranian-designed attack drones (known as "Geran" in Russian), Timur Shagivaleev, the man behind one of the country's biggest drone factories, has every reason to feel emboldened.

Instead of shying away from dis-cussing details of the plant, he shows off the construction facility at the site in southern Russia.

Dozens of new buildings, believed to be new dormitories and production facilities, have been rapidly taking shape since the winter snow melted this year, reports CNN.

Australian politician **Gareth Ward found** guilty of rape

Canberra: A politician from New South Wales (NSW) has been found guilty of sexually assaulting two young men in Australia.

A jury found Gareth Ward - who is still a sitting member of state parlia-ment - guilty of three counts of indecent assault and one count of rape.

Both of the victims, who were aged 18 and 24, said they were assaulted at Ward's home after meeting the 44-year-old through political circles between 2013 and 2015, reports BBC.

Ward resigned as a state government minister and from the Liberal Party, when the accusations emerged in 2021, but refused to leave parliament and was re-elected as the member for Kiama in 2023. Ward will return to court later this vear to be sentenced.

Alabuga began producing Shahed drones in 2023 and it now also churns out cheaper versions designed to act as decoys (known as 'Gerbera"). The site was already expanding as Russian drone attacks on Ukraine started to ramp up last August and recent satellife images reveal even faster growth over the past few months.

A July 12 image shows at least 104 identical rectangular buildings either fully or partially built, with a similar footprint to existing structures known to be worker dormitories.

ment insisted that the Geelong Treaty "builds on the strong foundation of trilateral cooperation be-tween Australia, the UK and the United States," advancing the shared objectives of the AUKUS partnership. It will enable the development of SSN-AUKUS and resilient trilateral supply chains, it said.

In September 2021, the United States, the UK, and Australia jointly announced the establishment of a trilateral security partnership and cooperation on nuclear-powered submarines.

As a non-nuclear-weapon state, Australia's involvement in a project with high risks of nuclear proliferation has raised serious concerns within the international community about the deepening of military alliances among the three countries and the potential undermining of regional peace and stability.

10 soldiers killed as Yemeni forces clash with Houthis in Saada

Aden, Yemen: Yemen's pro-government forces said they had repelled a large-scale attack launched by Houthi militia targeting military positions in the northern province of Saada.

In a statement posted on social media platform X, the forces on Friday said they "thwarted a largescale attack" by Houthis on the Aleb military front, north of Saada province.

The statement said 10 govern ment soldiers were killed in the confrontation, while "dozens of enemy fighters" were killed or wounded. I added that bodies of Houthi mili tants were found scattered across valleys in the area, and three Houthi

military vehicles were destroyed. No immediate response was available from the Houthi group regarding the reported confrontation.

Yemen has remained in a fragile state of calm since the collapse of a UN-brokered truce at the end of 2022, with both sides failing to agree on its renewal or expansion

Taiwan holds controversial vote targeting 'pro-China' lawmakers



The issue has deeply divided Tai-wanese society, which has seen large rallies and fierce debate.

US to review, reduce number of its troops in Europe

Washington: The United States is reviewing the positions of its troops on a global scale, the presence of US forces in the European region will decrease, Estonian Defense Minister Hanno Pevkur said.

On Friday, during a visit to Washington, Pevkur, with counterparts from Latvia and Lithuania, met with US Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth to discuss cooperation aimed at enhancing transatlantic ties, the ERR broadcaster reported.

"As for the position of the US troops on a global scale, it is now un-der review... This process is being carried out in cooperation with the Supreme Commander of Forces in Europe and NATO headquarters. It is possible that more precise figures will be announced in the autumn," Pevkur told the ERR.

African Union-Somalian troops jointly thwart Al-Shabaab attack

Ababa/Mogadishu: Addis African Union (AU) troops backed by Somali security forces thwarted an attack on military bases by the extremist Al-Shabaab group in Sabiid-Anole town, located southwest of the capital Mogadishu. The AU Support and Stabilisation Mission in Somalia (AUSSOM) said Al-Shabab fighters had launched a coordinated attack on military bases manned by AU troops and Somali National Armed Forces in the early hours of the day yesterday. "The joint forces successfully repelled the terrorists, forcing them to retreat swiftly," AUS-SOM said in a statement. Eyewitnesses said the assault erupted with a series of explosions in the nearby villages before the two sides exchanged gunfire.

Police investigating separate shootings at 2 western Sydney homes

Sydney: Sydney police are investigating separate shootings at two residences in the city's western suburbs on Friday night. Po-lice in the state of New South Wales (NSW) said on Saturday that officers were called to reports of gunshots being fired into the first home in Croydon Park, 10 km west of central Sydney, around 8 p.m. on Friday. One man, three women and two children were inside the premises at the time but there were no reported injuries. Officers were told that a man was seen on foot firing two shots from a pistol into the home before entering a nearby vehicle and fleeing the scene.

In the latest development, the Cambodian Ministry of National Defence said the Thai army on Saturday expanded its military attacks to another Cambodian province,

Torrential rains kill 266 in Pakistan in past one month



Islamabad (UNI)

Torrential monsoon rain-related incidents have killed 266 people and injured 633 others across Pakistan over the past 30 days, according to data released by the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) vesterday.

According to the NDMA's latest

situation report, no new fatalities were recorded in the past 24 hours, while five injuries were reported. The data covers the period from June 26 to July 25

Punjab reported the highest number of casualties, with 144 peo-ple killed and 493 injured. In the northwestern Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province, 63 people were reported dead and 79 others injured.

Sindh recorded over 25 fatalities and 40 injuries. Meanwhile, 16 deaths and four injuries were reported from Balochistan. Gilgit-Baltistan and Islamabad reported eight fatalities, while two lost their lives in POK.

Children accounted for a significant proportion of the fatalities na-tionwide, with 126 reported dead and 209 injured.

Senior Pakistani officer among 23 killed as BLA expands guerrilla warfare across Balochistan

Balochistan, Pakistan: The Baloch Liberation Army (BLA) has asserted responsibility for a series of simultaneous armed operations throughout various areas of Balochistan, claiming that its fighters killed a minimum of 23 members of the Pakistani military, including a high-ranking officer, and caused substantial damage to military facilities and assets linked to intelligence, The Balochistan post reported.

As per The Balochistan Post, BLA spokesperson Jeeyand Baloch indicated that the group's fighters targeted Pakistani forces in locations such as Mastung, Kalat, Zamuran, Buleda, and Quetta, also conducting assaults in Nushki, Dalbandin, and Panjgur.

At least 8 killed, 13 wounded in "terror" attack in SE Iran

Tehran (UNI)

At least eight people, namely five civilians and three assailants, were killed and 13 others were injured in a "terrorist" attack Saturday morning on the building of the justice department in Iran's southeastern city of Zahedan, the capital of Sistan and Baluchestan province, the semi-official Tasnim news agency reported.

Responsibility for the attack has been claimed by Jaish al-Zulm, designated by Iran as a terrorist group, the report said.

It added that upon entering the justice department's premises, the 'terrorists" opened fire on the people there, stressing that the casualties could further increase.

Iran's Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC) said in a statement published on its official news outlet



Sepah News that its ground forces managed to kill three of the "terrorists.

The IRGC added that some of those injured in the attack were in critical condition, giving the assurance that security forces had the sit uation under control.

Starmer delays Palestinian recognition despite MPs pressure

London (UNI)

UK Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer has rejected calls from 122 MPs to immediately recognise a Palestinian state, insisting that any such move must be part of a broader peace plan. His remarks come as US President Donald Trump arrived in the UK amid the ongoing humanitarian crisis in Gaza and growing international momentum, including from France, for recognition of Palestine.

Following French President Emmanuel Macron's announcement, UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer has declared that his government is working on a roadmap to achieve lasting peace in the Middle East, with the recognition of a Palestinian state as a key component.



"Alongside our closest allies, I am working on a pathway to peace in the region, focused on practical solutions," Starmer said in a video message posted on X yesterday. "That

pathway will set out concrete steps to turn the desperately needed ceasefire into a lasting peace. Recog-nition of a Palestinian state has to be one of those steps. I am unequivocal about that.'

His statement comes amid growing pressure from British lawmakers. 221 MPs from nine political parties yesterday signed an open letter urg-ing Starmer to move forward with formal recognition of Palestine, as per local media reports.

We write to you in advance of the UN Conference co-chaired by France and Saudi Arabia on July 28-29 in New York, to put on record our support for UK recognition of a Palestinian state," the letter, shared on X by MP Sarah Champion, stated. "We are expectant that the outcome

of the conference will be the UK Government outlining when and how it will act on its long-standing commitment to a two-state solution.

While the letter acknowledges that the UK alone cannot secure Palestinian independence, it emphasizes that recognition "would have a significant impact," and urges the government to take that crucial step.

"We are expectant that the outcome of the conference will be the UK Government outlining when and how it will act on its long-standing commitment," said the letter, shared by senior Labour MP Sarah Champion, who called recognition "a powerful symbolic message that we support the rights of the Palestinian people.

Israeli army says killed Hamas counter-intelligence commander in Gaza

Jerusalem: The Israel Defence Forces (IDF) said on Friday that it had killed a Hamas counter-intelligence commander in a strike in the northern Gaza Strip.

Amjad Muhammad Hassan Shaer, head of the counter-intelligence directorate in Hamas' General Security Apparatus, was killed on Wednesday, the IDF said in a statement.

According to the Israeli army, the directorate is responsible for thwarting espionage and securing senior Hamas officials

The statement added that over the past day, in cooperation with ground forces, the Israeli Air Force struck dozens of military targets in the Gaza Strip.
